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SAFE CHILD CENTER 30TH ANNIVERSARY

NAH recognized its Safe Child Center (SCC) for providing 30 years of healing to the communities of northern Arizona. SCC serves children and their families by offering them support during forensic interview processes and medical forensic exams during criminal investigations or after victimization. The family is provided advocacy, counseling services, and education on victims' rights during court proceedings and investigations. The program also provides medical consultations to help ensure best practice medical response and training for investigators and prosecutors. Since its inception in 1994, Safe Child Center has proudly provided 7,987 services to families.
