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2024 MASON AWARDS

Thirteen NAH colleagues received a 2024 Mason Award. These awards are an annual recognition honoring NAH nurses and technicians who demonstrate resilience, empathy, competence, integrity and a deep passion for nursing. This prestigious recognition was renamed in 2018 to honor Jessica Diefenbach's son, Mason, who passed away in a tragic accident. Jessica and her family were, and still are, profoundly grateful for the care they received at Flagstaff Medical Center (FMC) on that heartbreaking day, and it inspired them to recognize nurses and technicians who go above and beyond when supporting patients.

In addition, the NAH Office of Philanthropy partnered with Findlay Toyota Flagstaff to provide Nurse of the Year Kristie Riebe, RN, and Tech of the Year Judah Landavaso with custom Mason Award vehicles, which they can use for an entire year.

NAH recognized Kim Carlton, PA-C, as the Verde Valley Medical Center (VVMC) APP of the Year. NAH also recognized RJ Reed, CRNA, as the recipient of the Greg Cox APP of the Year Award, a recognition that was renamed in 2023 to commemorate the legacy of Greg Cox, PA-C. The awards recognize providers who excel in patient care and demonstrate exceptional commitment to safety and quality.

Colleagues who nominated Kim and RJ say they are shining examples of NAH's mission and values. One of Kim's colleagues said, "Her work ethic is unmatched. Kim always advocates for her patients and staff and is a huge asset to Team NAH." RJ's colleagues say he is a great leader and an excellent CRNA. They also say he is well respected by his team and always goes the extra mile for his patients, never shying away from tough operating room cases.



REMEMBERING GREG COX AND LINDSEY WATSON

Greg Cox, PA-C, and Lindsey Watson sadly passed away in the fall of 2023, and NAH held a ceremony with family and friends to honor their life, legacy and lasting impact on the organization. It was an opportunity to gather as a community, share stories and place remembrance leaves on NAH's memorial wall.



CHILDREN'S HEALTH CENTER AWARDED A \$50,000 GRANT

Arizona Complete Health awarded capital grants to 42 Arizona organizations in 2024. As part of this effort, it awarded NAH's Children's Health Center (CHC) with a \$50,000 grant to install a shade structure over its adaptive playground. While weather conditions sometimes limit access to the playground, the shade structure will extend the amount of time children can use the playground throughout the year. This is a meaningful improvement for patient care because the playground supports children with rehabilitation, offering engaging outdoor activities for those with physical and developmental disabilities.

Anthony Gobe, Practice Manager at CHC, played a key role in securing this grant. Since 2021, Anthony has helped bring in over \$680,000 in philanthropic dollars to CHC. His partnership with the NAH Office of Philanthropy is making a profound and lasting impact, improving the care provided to children of northern Arizona.



COFFEE FOR A CURE

The Human Bean's Coffee for a Cure giveback program is held every October during Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Last year, the Cottonwood-area coffee shop donated all food and beverage proceeds made on Friday, Oct. 18, to the Cancer Centers of NAH's Breast Health Program. The following month, as part of this initiative, it presented the NAH Breast Care Clinic team in Sedona with a check valued at \$1,991.12. NAH IN THE COMMUNITY

Giving back to non-profits and organizations in northern Arizona allows NAH to highlight those making a difference in our community. As part of this initiative, NAH supported the Alzheimer's Association and its Walk to End Alzheimer's in Cottonwood. The mission of the Alzheimer's Association is to lead the way in ending Alzheimer's and all other dementia by accelerating global research, driving risk reduction and early detection, and maximizing quality care and support.

Verde Valley Ambulance Company purchased two Evac-U-Splints to provide better patient care. Evac-U Splints provide comfort to patients when spinal immobilization is required. The mattresses mold to the specific contours of a patient's body without applying pressure while also offering uniform support and reducing pressure point tenderness.

The month of February is designated as American Heart Month, but NAH Cardiovascular Institute (CVI) celebrates your heart every day! Its service line is comprised of heart experts who provide extraordinary, comprehensive care close to home.

In 2004, NAH became the first health care system to perform open-heart surgery at an elevation of 7,000 feet – a procedure once thought to be impossible at this altitude. Today, our open-heart surgery program combines the expertise of Arizona's best cardiothoracic surgeons with NAH's highly skilled clinical team and the latest in technique and equipment.
